

The California Faculty Association represents faculty at all 23 CSU campuses [Bargaining Unit 3]. Faculty include tenured and tenure-track Professors, Lecturers, Counselors, Librarians, and Coaches. CFA tracks the headcount (number of individuals) and number of full-time equivalent (FTE) faculty. In Fall 2009, there were 22,703 individual faculty members employed across the CSU system.



DISTRIBUTION OF CSU FACULTY BY RANK (HEADCOUNT), FALL 2009



→ In terms of headcount, approximately half of the faculty members are Lecturers (systemwide). Together, Counselors, Coaches and Librarians comprise about 6 percent of the faculty. In addition to Lecturers and Coaches, who all have temporary appointments, an increasing number of Librarians and Counselors are being hired into temporary appointments.

→ The distribution of faculty by rank varies widely from campus to campus. While 48 percent of the faculty are lecturers, systemwide, on one campus 2 in 3 faculty members are lecturers (Channel Islands). At the other extreme, at Cal Poly SLO, only 1 in 3 faculty are lecturers. This year the CSU Stansilaus administration cut close to half of its lecturer jobs; as a result the distribution of faculty by rank at that campus is atypical compared to prior years. In 2007, for example, 47 percent of the faculty at Stanislaus were lecturers.





Full-Time Equivalent positions are calculated as the sum of all part-time appointments. Consistent with patterns across the country, the CSU administration increasingly chooses to favor part-time, temporary appointments. In Fall 2009, there were 16,728 full-time equivalent faculty positions across the CSU system. DISTRIBUTION OF CSU FACULTY BY RANK (FTEF), FALL 2009



→ In terms of Full-Time Equivalent positions, only about a third are Lecturer positions (compared with half when measuring by headcount). Almost all tenure-line positions are full-time positions so the headcount and FTE numbers are very similar for these classifications.



[▶] In addition to the number of positions and faculty members across the CSU system, CFA also reports summaries of aggregated data about the race or ethnicity reported by CSU faculty members. The categories available to us for analysis are limited by the data collected and reported by the CSU administration, from whom we receive the information. Because of privacy laws, CFA does not identify faculty by name and race/ethnicity.




RACE/ETHNICITY OF CSU FULL PROFESSORS, FALL 2009



⇒ Some of the results of efforts to diversify the faculty can be seen in this series of charts, which show the race/ ethnicity of faculty according to rank. For instance, almost three-quarters of Full Professors identify as White while only 58 percent of Assistant professors do. Note the differences between the tenure line ranks and the Lecturers.

→ These charts show the same information for faculty who are Counselors, Librarians, and Coaches.





→ In terms of both headcount and FTE, just under half of the faculty in the CSU are female this year. As indicated in this table and shown in the charts that follow, there is also variation on this statistic from campus to campus and by rank. The difference in proportion of women and men does not change dramatically between headcount and FTE.




PERCENT OF FACULTY WHO ARE FEMALE, BY CAMPUS - FALL 2009



→ The campuses that vary most from the average in terms of gender diversity are the specialized campuses, the Cal Maritime Academy, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, and Cal Poly Pomona. CSU San Marcos is also notable, with women comprising almost 60 percent of the faculty there.




Full Professors, 2009




→ About 2/3 of CSU Full Professors are men and just over half of Associate Professors are men. However, slightly more than half of the Assistant Professors are women. Women are also slightly overrepresented among Lecturers.




Coaches, 2009



Counselors, 2009





→ A large majority of CSU Librarians and Counselors are women . By contrast, only about 1/3 of the Coaches are women.

→ CFA has been tracking the number of CSU instructional faculty by race/ethnicity since 1985. The racial/ethnic diversity of faculty has shifted over the years. However, in 2009, almost 3 in 4 faculty members [who identify their race or ethnicity to the University] identify as white. Over the years, the number of faculty members who do not report their race or ethnicity, or for whom the data are unavailable, has grown to over 1,000 from almost none in 1985.





CSU Instructional Faculty, by Gender (Headcount): 1985 to 2009



→ CFA has been tracking the gender of CSU instructional faculty since 1985. The gender diversity of the faculty has changed significantly over the years, with women today representing almost half of all instructional faculty. As shown in the charts on the previous pages, there continues to be wide variation between ranks.






Percent of CSU Faculty, by Race/Ethnicity: 2007-2009



→ There are many questions about how measures adopted by the CSU administration in response to budget cuts have affected diversity in the university. One result of the drastic cuts to the CSU budget in 2008-9 and 2009-10 is a sharp reduction in the number of Lecturers employed. This graph shows that the percentages of faculty in each race/ethnic category has not really changed over the past couple of years. See also the graph on the next page.




Percent Change in Number of CSU Faculty, by Ethnic Group: 2007 to 2009



▶ In comparison to the previous graph, this one is based on the change in the *number* of faculty members in each race/ethnic group [rather than the relative proportions of each group]. Here the data show a notable decrease in the number of faculty of color. Overall, there was an 11% reduction in the number of CSU faculty employed in fall 2009 compared with fall 2007.




Percent of CSU Student Enrollment, by Race/Ethnic Group: 2007-2009



→ There are many questions about how measures adopted by the CSU administration in response to budget cuts have affected the diversity of the student body. One result of the drastic cuts to the CSU budget in 2008-9 and 2009-10 is a planned reduction in enrollment. This graph shows how the percentages of students in each race/ ethnic category changed over the past couple of years, in spite of the enrollment restrictions. The slight growth in enrollment of Latino/a students is a reflection of rising demand for college by Latino/as. How might these numbers look if enrollment was being increased to reflect the growing demand rather than being cut? See also the graph the next page.



Percent Change in Numbers of CSU Students, by Ethnic Group: 2007 to 2009



⇒ In comparison to the previous graph, this one is based on the change in the *number* of students in each race/ ethnic group [rather than the relative proportions of each group]. Since 2007, there has been no change in the total number of students in the CSU. Here the data show which groups of students have grown in number and which have not. Anyone interested in these trends should consult two new reports released by the California Postsecondary Education Commission about enrollment demand and projections, by ethnicity.
